EDITOR'S NOTES

This issue introduces information on twelve previously undocumented 19th century Ohio gunsmiths, whose names do not appear in the 5 volume Ohio Gunsmiths & Allied Tradesman series of publications and other volumes edited by Donald A. Hutslar (with the input from many AOLRC members), volumes edited by James Whisker, and the more recent Arms Makers of Ohio (Spiker and Whisker). Though these volumes reflect the great amount of research done on Ohio gunsmiths in the 1980s and 1990s, there are still names, stories, rifles, and related items to be uncovered. The many unmarked guns in existence remain tantalizing mysteries, including those exhibiting high levels of craftsmanship that would warrant recognition by name. This issue also contains a close look at a rifle from Hardin county that exhibit's an unusual two-piece configuration, and pictures of two rifles by different makers with oddly similar patchboxes—illustrating the sometimes confusing situation of where and when to place rifles with the

same or similar signatures, and raising questions about lines and interstices of transmission of techniques and patterns.

I would like to thank the contributors to this and other recent issues, and again ask for more articles and photo essays. These are needed in order to maintain an interesting and informative level of content and to promote research and appreciation of the unique items of early Ohio history and folk culture that are our passion. - The preferred format for articles is a Word document. Please use size 12 font, single or double space, 1 inch margins.
- Printed photographs, drawings, and typed or handwritten manuscripts can be mailed to: Mark Bender

- 3. Articles in Word (or compatible system), photos (j-pegs or other formats), and correspondence can be emailed to this address: mabgogo@yahoo.com
- 4. Please put "AOLRCfile" in the subject line of the email.
- 5. Please run a spelling and grammar check on your e-files and otherwise proofread them.
- Please put the title and author's name at the top of the article; use the same font size for the whole article.
- 7. **Photographs** can be color or black and white. If you are not a professional, good results can be obtained

- by taking photos of objects in soft. outdoor light. Lay the object on a non-reflective black background (blanket, etc.) with no background clutter. Please keep in mind how a color image might look if presented in black and white. Photos should be clear and sharp. (Professionals will, of course, have their own protocols.)
- 8. Use past issues as a guideline to content. Ideas for articles include local or family histories of pre-1900 Ohio gunsmiths and the use of muzzle-loading arms; detailed descriptions of representative or unique rifles (in terms of features or level of craftsmanship); accoutrements; short interviews with AOLRC members relating to collecting and appreciation of the Ohio long rifle as a folk art; accounts of early shooting clubs, shoots, tales, etc.
- The newsletter is normally published twice a year. Submissions are always welcome, however timely notices for the Spring or Fall shows need to be received at least 6 weeks in advance.
